Rain earlier in the week retreated for a brisk but dry Fall Tour. The route followed some pristine touring roads on both days as we traveled through the Princeton, IL area.

On Friday, traveling the Great Sauk trail brought us to Ryan's Round Barn in Johnson Sauk Trail State Park. Anyone who just thought from the outside that this "was just another barn" quickly changed their opinion when they entered. The intricacies of its construction, the innovative ideas and details of construction we learned from



our very informative hosts.

From there it was on to Kewanee for lunch. Many found their way to Cerno's, featuring one of the longest bars in Illinois, the original bar installed by the Pabst Brewery in 1898. Afterward, several strolled through Good's Furniture, sprawling in about 20 buildings across several blocks in downtown Kewanee. Others visited the Kewanee Historical Society's Museum, with 2 stories chock full with trinkets of Kewanee's past.

To end the day's touring we stopped at Woody's Garage for a short rest stop. The garage's interior features many scenes, from a service station to a 1950's soda fountain. A handful of interesting vehicles were also on hand, outside and in, including a vintage camper and all the extras.


AN ARTIST IN OUR MIDST

reads," Five dollars fine for driving more than 12 horses, mules or cattle at a time or for leading any beast faster than a walk on or across this bridge." I don't know who was there to keep track of who broke this rule.

Saturday's banquet brought a meal of great food and a discussion that rehashed the past few days. Each of our stops had gracious and informative hosts that made every stop exciting. That, coupled with some great touring roads (which were not full of potholes, a treat in Illinois), made for a fantastic time.


I received this recipe from Walgreens for making a donation the ADA. The recipe is from <u>The Family Classics Cookbook</u> by the ADA. This is a healthy version of stuffing.

SAGE STUFFING

Ingredients:

- 30 slices (1-ounce each) day-old whole-grain bread, crusts removed, cut into small cubes
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 3 large celery stalks, chopped





3 cups hot low-fat, reduced-sodium chicken broth 1 egg, lightly beaten

1/2 cup dried cranberries or dried cherries, coarsely chopped

Kosher salt & fresh-ground black pepper to taste Paprika

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 375° F. Add the bread to a large bowl.
- 2. Heat the olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the onions and celery, and sauté for 3 minutes. Add the walnuts and sauté for 2 minutes. Add in the sage and cook for 1 minute.
- 3. Add the onion-sage mixture to the bread. Pour the hot chicken broth and egg over the onion-sage, and mix well (until moist). Add in the cranberries or cherries. Season well with salt and pepper. Add the mixture to a large casserole dish, and sprinkle with paprika.
- 4. Bake for about 40-45 minutes until it is browned and crusty.

PRE-WAR TOUR

The Waukegan/ North Shore Chapter held its annual Pre-War tour on Sunday October 2. Since the Pre-War tour has had a disappointing turnout in the past, we hoped to expand the number of participants by combining our pre-war tour with the Illinois Brass Touring Region Fall Color Tour. In addition to the Illinois Region, other local clubs with pre-war era cars were invited to attend including the Dairyland Tin Lizzies Club, the Chain-O-Lakes Model A Club and the Nash club. The tour was planned by Al Moody, who is a member of both the Waukegan/ North Shore Chapter and the Illinois Brass Touring Region, and by Pres and Dan Helgren.

We had decided to have our tour in the Kenosha and Racine counties of Wisconsin. Both the cities of Racine and Kenosha had a rich automotive history and we had decided to highlight some of the pioneers in these cities.

Despite a rainy few days before the tour, it was forecast to be cloudy and cooler for the day, but we did experience intermittent rain. This did not seem to dampen the spirits of the participants as we had 23 pre-war cars and 46 people attend the tour, including several early brass cars. The earliest car on the tour was a 1909 Model T Roadster belonging to Art Bergstrom of Beecher who kept his top down all day. Other

attendees with early cars included Scott and Cheryl Stier from Huntley in their 1911 Model T and the Zangls and Wilcoxs drove their Model T depot hacks from Germantown, WI.

Our tour started at the McDonalds in Pleasant Prairie, WI and we headed westerly and traveled several of the rustic roads near Camp Lake and Silver Lake before reaching our first



stop at Brightonwoods Orchard and Winery.

They have a wide variety of apples including varieties favored by the early settlers in this country. Several of our members also sampled some of the wine and spirits that they produce.

After leaving Brightonwoods Orchards we headed northeasterly into Racine County ending up in Franksville for lunch. Franksville is known for producing sauerkraut and many farms grow cabbage throughout the area.

After lunch we headed east and ended up along the shore of Lake Michigan on Lighthouse Drive stopping at the Wind Point Lighthouse. This

was intended to be a short stop but many enjoyed visiting the restored lighthouse, residence and other restored buildings as well as a walking along the lakefront path and along the prairie gardens.

Leaving the lighthouse we followed the lake into the city of Racine and along Main Street past the many beautiful Victorian houses owned by many of the early industrialists in town including the home originally built for the Mitchell family who co-founded the Lewis-Mitchell Motorcar Company, maker of Mitchell automobiles, which was at one time the largest employer in the city. The original factory is several blocks west of the family home and is now being used for loft apartments.

Continuing south into Kenosha we traveled along the lakefront to the Kenosha History Center. This was our last stop and we visited the museum run by the Kenosha Historical Society. They

had a section devoted to Kenosha made automobiles and had a few rare automobiles including one of the first Ramblers, and an early Jeffery.

What become American Motors was originally established by Thomas Jeffery who built Rambler and Jeffery cars before being acquired by Charles Nash in 1916 and renaming the company after himself.

On the final leg of the tour we continued along historic Third Avenue past some lovely old homes including two that were owned by the Jeffery and Nash families.

BACK TO THE FUTURE: WHY THE DELOREAN?

If you read the March/April issue of Antique Automobile, you may have noticed the AACA Library's column detailing John De Lorean's attempt to make it on his own with the DMC-12 sports car. Amidst economic woe and scandal,

the DeLorean Motor Company folded in 1982, taking with it the DMC-12, or so it seemed. In 1985, a time traveling epic took the world by storm, and the film's signature DMC-12 time machine revitalized the car's image in American popular culture. Still the question remains; out of all the possibilities why was the DeLorean chosen to be the time machine in Back to the Future (BTTF)?


In Hollywood, drafting scripts is the equivalent of creating a prototype. An initial concept is presented and is subject numerous revisions before thefinal product is released. For example, the finished version of BTTF had Doc Brown harness the power of lightning to transport Mary from 1955 to 1985. However, earlier drafts called for a nuclear detonation instead. Although the Cold War tie-in was scrapped due to budgeting concerns Steven Spielberg, one of BTTF's producers, would later implement elements of this idea into Indian Jones IV.

Before its onscreen appearance, the time machine went through several revisions. In fact, the original contraption was more akin to a giant refrigerator. Later, it was decided a car made for a far more interesting plot device, as it could be driven between different locations.

As for why the DMC-12 was selected over any other car, it all boiled down to the ultramodern gullwing doors. In an interview with

Empire Magazine, Director Robert Zemeckis remarked: "We decided to use a DeLorean automobile because of this joke we had in the movie. When the time machine arrives in the past, the people in the farmhouse think it's and alien spaceship."

While gullwing doors were nothing new in



Ron Cobb's blueprints for the time machine, and the technical drawing he created (above) called for eccentricity and simplicity. The nuclear reactor was miniaturized, based on a real one.

The engine system was given a large steamventing system, and small control rods for the reactor. A flux capacitor was added to provide fireworks for special time-travel effects.

1955 (the Mercedes-Benz 300 SL debuted in 1952), they were far from the norm. Likewise, the sharp angles of the DMC-12 were a radical departure from the curves and fins of the 50s, making for a convincingly hilarious scene.

When making the tie machine, the DMC-12 needed to look believable. Ron Cobb, a designer behind the time traveling version of the car, wanted it to have a more "homemade" appearance. Apparently, Cobb's connection with the car also extends beyond the film. In an interview Cobb claimed, "(DeLorean) wrote me a letter saying I could join his design team anytime I wanted to. That was before he was arrested for cocaine."

Onscreen, the finished product mesmerized audiences worldwide and became one of the most beloved automotive "actors" of all time. To learn more about the original DMC-12 and its creator, be sure to check out the Library, which has a nice collection of DeLorean sales literature. Their periodical collection even features a wealth of period magazine articles on the car, including the one used in Back to the Future!


