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Monthly Recipe



Sweet treat with Corned Beef!

Irish Soda Bread



Ingredients:

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons cold butter, cubed
- 2 large eggs, room temperature, divided use
- 3/4 cup buttermilk
- 1/3 cup raisins

Directions:

Preheat oven to 375°. Whisk together first 5 ingredients. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. In another bowl, whisk together 1 egg and buttermilk. Add to flour mixture; stir just until moistened. Stir in raisins.

Turn onto a lightly floured surface; knead gently 6-8 times. Shape into a 6-1/2-in. round loaf; place on a greased <u>baking</u> <u>sheet</u>. Using a sharp knife, make a shallow cross in top of loaf. Whisk remaining egg; brush over top.

Bake until golden brown, 30-35 minutes. Remove from pan to a wire rack. Serve warm.

Making Your own Decals- by Bill Vroman

Anyone who's in the old car hobby and doing restoration has at one time or another uttered the words "I just can't find it!" and then found a way to live without it, use an alternative solution or fabricate it.


If you have a pre-war car or one built by someone other than GM or Ford you probably have found it difficult to impossible to find decals or stickers that are correct. I had this issue when looking for original items for our 1953 Chrysler. When we purchased Lucy, many of the labels under the hood were missing or in poor shape. While we were able to find items used across many years such as the oil filter and crankcase breather stickers, we were unable to find others such as the heater and air cleaner decals which were present but in poor condition.

This may not be for everyone, but if you have a computer and a color ink jet printer, you can create replicas of the various stickers and decals for you car. If you have an existing, but damaged item where you can still determine the overall shape, size, color, text and graphics, it's then possible to reproduce them. If you can purchase a commercial replica,, it might be cheaper and will likely last longer, but if it's not available this may be your only alternative. If you're goal is a complete, by the numbers restoration and you can't get the decal or sticker you need but you know what it needs to look like then with knowledge of a photo editing program, or a couple days of time to build proficiency, it's possible to make them at a cost of less than \$5 per 8 ½ x 11 sheet for materials, plus your time.

What you'll need:

- A computer with a photo editing package and a color ink jet printer. I used Adobe Photo Shop and an Canon MP160 photo quality printer.
- Appropriate printable media. You can get decal paper compatible with an ink jet printer from Amazon. Search for "decal paper". If your goal is an adhesive backed sticker, there are various products available including adhesive backed vinyl sheets.
- Some ability with graphics or art. Either you have this, or you don't. If you don't try, you won't know.
- Time

The decal's I've reproduced are for my 1953 Chrysler New Yorker and have been basic in shape and color containing simple text. This sort of item is fairly common on most model years. When graphics are present, you can often obtain copies from Internet web sites and adapt them to your needs. For example, I made a decal for the heater on my car and needed the Mopar logo, which unlike the other text can't just be typed in. I cut the logo from another source and using the option for changing colors in my photo editor I was able to include it in my decal.





If the decal has detailed graphics, a photo, or a copy of those graphics from some other source is a

must. The most challenging label I have done was the red Chrysler Corporation firewall tag. My original was nothing more than an aluminum blank with a few remaining flecks of red paint. I saw and bid on an old one that was in OK shape on an Internet auction. I lost the auction, but kept a copy of the photo. I was able to touch up that photo and make a decal that I'm quite proud of. I buffed the remaining paint off the original blank, but found the backside to be in near perfect condition. After making my decal and putting it on the newly buffed blank, I now have a replacement that even a concourse judge might not detect as a replacement.





When commercial decals are made, they're a silkscreen type process where all of the colors, including white, are printed on a clear transfer sheet. The problem with most inkjet and even laser printers is they rely on a white background. Because inkjet printers don't print white, Inkjet decal paper is offered in both clear and white. The clear decal paper is most effective on light backgrounds and can have a look similar to anodizing when used on bare metal. The other key to this inkjet-based paper is the use of a clear aerosol spray fixative that's also flexible. Once the fixative has dried, you cut out your decal, and you've got a traditional water slide decal. Simply put it in water for 30 seconds and slide it off onto your target surface same as the models you might have made in your youth. I always get the target wet too as it allows me to position the decal exactly where I want it. Smooth out the decal and you're done.

Things to keep in mind:

- The better quality printer, the better quality print. Our Cannon MP160 is a photo quality printer which allows for good color matching.
- The decal paper is relatively expensive. Pack your sheets as full as possible. You won't always get a perfect outcome so having multiple copies of the same decal on the sheet is a good idea. You can always save the spares for later detailing updates or share with others in need.
- The white decal paper is good for almost all jobs. It's what you need to use if the decal is going onto a dark background or a background that you don't want the color to show through. Also keep in mind that if you put a decal made with the clear decal paper on a colored surface, any color except black will merge with the background color so a red decal on a yellow background may appear to have an orange tint.

I created my original decals for our 53 Chrysler almost 20 years ago now. Many of the ones under the hood have degraded to the point of embarassment due to heat and/or oily conditions. There is now less of the air cleaner decal I created than there was of the original when aquired the car. However, the ones on the heater box and firewall remain intact without any issues.

I've posted the images of the stickers and decals I've created for our Chrysler to thingiverse.com. This site is where you can find many things that can be created with laser etching, 3D printing. A brief scan found a few obsolete car parts have been duplicated and posted here as well as a large number of automotive trinkets.
