

Monthly Recipe



Loaded Baked Potato Soup

Submitted by Chris Schurrer

Here is another great recipe provided by Chris.

Ingredients:

9 Medium Red Potatoes
2/3 Cup Butter
2/3 Cup Flour
6 Cups Whole Milk
1/2 Teaspoon Salt
1 Teaspoon Pepper
1/2 - 1lb. Bacon - Cooked - Cut into 1" pieces
(amount to preference)
1 Cup Cooked Chopped Green Onion
16 Oz. Shredded Cheddar Cheese
12 Oz. Sour Cream

Directions:

Prick potatoes w/ fork and microwave or cook 3 - 4 at a time. When cooked, cube potatoes w/ skin on. In a large sauce pan over medium heat melt butter, stir in flour. Cook about 1 minute or until golden brown. Whisk in milk a little at a time stirring constantly until thickened. Stir in cubed potatoes, salt, pepper, bacon, 1/2 cup green onions, 12 oz. cheese. Cook until thoroughly heated. Stir in sour cream and heat thru. Serve topped with remaining green onions and cheese. Enjoy!



Region Member Adventure:

TWO TRIPS TO CALIFORNIA, 2021

Rob and I return from our three-week road trip west the first week of November, in time for me to preside over the monthly DeKalb Car Club potluck. I'm president, but rarely know what's going on. Over chicken and salad, Frank Reiss fills me in on his plans; he's looking at an old car, not a Hudson, but it's in San Diego. Am I interested in going west again and bringing it back with him?

The trip we returned from was in a brand new 2022 Camaro SS convertible Rob ordered for the trek. White with black top, dark interior with red trim, the car is a stunner. It had 700 miles on the odometer when we left, 6,000 upon return, and Rob drove all but 200 of those.

Frank's proposed purchase is a black 1940 Ford Deluxe coupe, original flathead, in nice condition. The seller, Leonard Barbieri, has owned the car over forty years. A former board member of the Flathead Ford V8 Club, Len has driven the car twice to the annual convention in Dearborn and as far east as New England. The seller is in his eighties, (so is Frank) and the family suggests it's time to trim the herd. In this digital age it's tough to determine if an item for sale actually exists, if the seller is a scam artist, but Frank has been following ads in the V8 Club national magazine, so it looks legit.

Before finding the Ford, Frank had put an offer on a restored '29 Studebaker. But the car was in one place, the seller another, and he wanted a deposit. I told Frank this was certainly a fraud. If you don't have your fingerprints on the sale item and title at the same time, it probably doesn't exist.

Drive or fly? If we take Frank's old Dodge pickup, he has to clean out his car trailer, which houses a post-war Continental coupe. Gas is expensive (not as much as this year) but we'd bring back a car that had unknown, to us, road qualities. If we took his truck, I'd get to detour in California to inspect a super-rare rough-but-solid 1942 Dodge three window coupe in blackout trim offered on Craigslist at \$1000.

Frank mentions driving out in a more fuel-efficient car. I offer the 2000 LeSabre as chase.

We crunch numbers, find flights out on United at just over \$200 each, and make reservations: leave O'Hare Sunday evening 9:00, arrive in San Diego just before 11:00 local. Rob books us rooms at the Hilton Oceanside San Diego. Using points, it costs us nothing, and at two miles from the airport, includes a free shuttle.

On our trip west the previous month, Rob and I stayed at historical Route 66 motor lodges: the Wagon Wheel in Cuba, MO; Road Runner Lodge Tucumcari; the Wig-Wam in Holbrook, AZ. Between the kitschy places Rob booked us into the historical Skirvin in Oklahoma City, site of the post-war Hudson introduction in early 1946, where they hoisted a Commodore sedan into a second-floor ballroom. We stayed at the Capitol in Little Rock, the Biltmore outside Phoenix, and when we were in San Diego, the Del Coronado, best known for Marilyn Monroe and her role in the movie 'Some Like it Hot' in 1959.

Leonards' friends Joe and Susan Valentino pick us up the next morning in a very nice charcoal black BMW suv. The '40, and Leonard are about fifteen minutes away. We pull up, here is this stunning black coupe, not restored but finely maintained, waiting in the driveway.

Before Frank and I get on the airplane the previous day, we have to go through security. Franks not interested in telling TSA what's in his pockets, but they ask, he tells them it's money and he doesn't want to put it on the conveyor belt! Totally understanding, they have him hold the envelopes over his head as he goes through the X-Ray.

Leonard is pleased to see the cash (Frank also has two perfectly legitimate money orders) and his people determine that the buyer and cohort (me) pass the no phony-baloney test. (I show them the photo of my Green Hornet with the Illinois AACA AV license plates. That helps.)

The seller also shows us two more flatties: a '35 rumble seat coupe in judging condition, Washington Blue, Cream wheels, and a 1950 Ford sedan assembled at the California plant for a company executive, documented with 1951 upgrades done at that plant. Unique and interesting! Both are for sale.

Frank has a '40 Ford two door sedan back home that he had in the TV production Lovecraft Country. He has been driving flathead Fords since before they were vintage and has no issue about driving the coupe away. It's Monday, November 22 at 10:30 AM local time, and the odometer reads 59,235 miles. I've never driven, or even rode in a flathead Ford, and a few miles down the road Frank pulls into a gas station, crawls under the hood and tightens the steering. And that's the big repair. This car runs beautifully!

The car was delivered February 1940 for \$727.28, paperwork in the owner's manual reads, from City Ford in Los Angeles. The original owner is a naval officer, apparently though his name isn't given, but a note to himself dated December 7, 1941, says he has to report to duty.

When Rob and I are southbound on the 805 in October enroute to the Del, the weather was foul, traffic a nightmare and GPS was intentionally trying to send us to Tijuana. Now Frank and I are northbound on the 805 on a clear, warm sunny Monday, and we FLY! You'd think a pristine Ford coupe to be a traffic stopper, but motorists in Southern California are mostly full of ennui. Maybe ten percent notice it's an old car. They wave and some honk, Frank has put his Illinois license plates on from the black two door. Car culture in SoCal is dying off, all the young dufusses have their heads in their computer thingies. It's sad, and one of the reasons the American auto industry is dying; manufacturers, with rare exception, don't build a product today that future generations will want to own.

In the days before air conditioning, travel across the desert could be brutal. Most motorists stopped during the day and proceeded at night. A canvas water bag slung off the front provided cool drinking water or a needed refill for the radiator. But we're heading east on Interstate 8 in late November, overheating is not an issue. We pass through Yuma, where Ford Motor Company did hot weather testing. The track may still be there, we don't look but stop at Arby's for lunch. After lunch Frank drains the radiator on the parking lot at Wal-Mart. It's only water, lightly stained brown. Leonard suggested we change the coolant for anti-freeze, something he's never needed in San Diego. Frank refills with distilled water and flush. Pressing on eastward, we stop for the night in Gila Bend at America's Choice Inn, which to be truthful, really isn't America's choice. But the staff is friendly, room rate reasonable. Frank mentioned driving straight through to Illinois to save money. I don't verbally question his sanity but recommend a proper nights' sleep for safety's sake.

8 becomes 10 south of Phoenix. We fill near Tucson, again in Lordsburg. Somewhere between here I hear a 'spring'. We find the starter Bendix spring has broken from now on we park on a slope or plan on a push start. Dang! Frank thinks we can stop at a junkyard, any yard should have a spring we can interchange. I suggest we detour north towards Santa Rosa, where 'Bozo' (his real name, and a champ at working on my Explorer in '17) has a shop.

It's a debate. If we stay on 10 the road ducks south after El Paso, but we stay in warm weather until dodging north. The Southwind heater doesn't function, a loose box of parts in the trunk suggests it's a good workshop project. If we duck north onto US 70 and then US 54, we make more of a beeline to our final destination, and with the US routes being mainly two lanes, the road is kindlier for an eighty-year-old auto. The road from Las Cruces to Carrizozo is stunningly beautiful. We pass White Sands National Monument outside Alamogordo. The Missile Range is not open to the public, but we're inclined to not stop anyhow. Trinity Site, where the first nuclear detonation took place, is not far off to the west. The road is fairly easy, but we are regularly through mountain passes over 5,000' and higher.

When I was a kid, a little kid before 1967, my neighbor four doors north owned a '40 Ford Deluxe coupe. Bill Van Dyken worked on it every summer, and it was immaculate. His daily driver was a two-tone green Mercury Sun Valley with the glass top, and also owned several other flathead Fords, each a stunning reflection on Fords' genius. Bill's '40 was medium green, my favorite color. I credit his influence with turning me towards this old car passion. In his passing, Bill has a Ford oval on his marker...

When we cleared San Diego traffic Frank put me behind the wheel. Impressed was I. Strong, torquey V8. Felt steady at 65, though the horse and buggy suspension reminded me most of my 1935 Terraplane sedan. Primitive, though I never sensed we might be going over. Ford didn't adapt to modern suspension until after the war, and even had the old suspension on the much more costly Lincoln. Did I like the V8 more than my flathead Terraplanes I used to tear around in? In the 1970's I ran across a '35 Ford coupe in Indiana. He ran around me and I had trouble keeping up in my silver '37 Terraplane sedan. We both arrived at the same car show, and I was disappointed (and maybe relieved) to find he had a late model overhead valve V8 under his hood.

So, no. I'm a flathead six person and will be until the day I check out.

The Ford handles the mountainous roads of central New Mexico just fine, and it's dark when we pull into the Super Eight in Santa Rosa. Frank grumbles about spending more money at a motel and doesn't sleep well. When I awake at 5:00 AM, he has already drained the radiator and refilled with a correct mixture of anti-freeze.

It's Wednesday morning, the next day is Thanksgiving and Rob has reservations at Salernos at 3:00. Frank is invited. So Franks' suggestion that we drive straight through now is more agreeable, and we won't turn off the engine so we shouldn't need to push start.

Bozo's shop is bypassed; maybe we'll stop by in the future. From Santa Rosa to Tucumcari, US 54 is also I-40. We take the bypass loop at Tucumcari and drive through scenic downtown (it really is) and regain the two lane. Entering Texas later in the morning, we fill the tank in the cow town of Dalhart. You may make the statement that all of Texas is a cow town; the locals, I think, will take it as a correct, even proudful, statement. It's only fifty miles to the Oklahoma line, and twenty more to Guymon where we refill.

This is Tornado Alley. When asked if his state gets much wind, an Oklahoma truck driver said some, but it's usually in the shape of a funnel.

Forty-five minutes later we enter the Great State of Kansas, where you can't buy beer on Sunday, even if you want to. Frank and I don't stop at the Mid-America Air Museum at Liberal, at the Dalton Gang hideout near Meade, or at the world's largest hand-dug well outside Brenham. 54 gently curves from northeast to straight east. The last time I saw a Lockheed Constellation in the air, it was over Wichita. We didn't see any Connies this time, and we headed northeast again, this time on I-35, the Kansas Turnpike. It pains me to pay for something your gas taxes should cover, since you're using the gas anyhow, but we're only on the toll road a hundred miles, dodging off at Emporia. It's evening when we reach Kansas City, I'm behind the wheel, traffic is flying like it's the Dan Ryan, and I get cut off by a jerk in a bronze Rolls Royce Cullinan with Missouri dealer plates. I may have extended a digit, but I later post the encounter on a Rolls Royce website. (The posting is deleted.)

Region Member Adventure: (Two trips continued...)


We're strictly northbound now on I-35, its night, our six-volt beams blind no one, we run into a traffic jam from an accident and pull off at Eagleville for gas and sandwiches. It's dark out, cold, and ten miles later we're in Iowa, heading for Des Moines. As Frank drives, my head is against the passenger window, wrapped like a mummy to stay warm. Ditto for Frank as I drive. We sleep and spell each other in shifts, like in the old days when I drove a tractor-trailer. This, in a 1940 Ford, is infinitely more fun, if not as warm!

Catching I-80 at Des Moines, we turn directly east. It's cold, but dry, and we stop for our last fill at Walcott. The truck collection is closed but we check out the several on display in the store area. I-88, the Reagan Toll Road, is our last leg. The old flathead Ford pulls into the driveway here in DeKalb at 3:20 AM Thanksgiving morning, with 2142 extra miles on the odometer. Frank declines the offer of a hot cuppa, and he's home before 4:00.

Would I do it again? How soon can we leave?!




